Overview

- After Paul left from his first visit to Galatia, discuss what happened to the Galatians.
- Compare what the Galatians did and what the Hebrews did when they came out of Egypt
- What do we learn from **Heb. 2:1-18** regarding neglecting salvation?

The Challenge: IMITATE ME AS I IMITATE CHRIST

Gal. 4:12-15

- Earlier in his letter to the Galatians, Paul called the Galatians “fools” and “backsliders.” His tone in this part of the letter changes. Discuss how/why Paul changes in this part of Galatians.
- Pastor said preaching the Gospel correctly is not the whole story. What else must the teacher do as he preaches the Gospel?
- What did Jesus mean when He said, “I have come to set the captives free?”
- In **Galatians 4:12-15**, what is Paul challenging his listeners, including us, to do?
- As Paul challenged the Galatians (and us), he reminds them he was once in bondage to the law. What did Paul do to experience freedom found only in Jesus Christ?
- Is this for the Galatians and for us?
- Paul also points to his observable life style among all people. Discuss what he was like with Jews and then with the Gentiles.
- What was he showing both groups?
- Why was it important for Paul to remind the Galatians that they still welcomed him?
- In **verse 15**, why would Paul ask the Galatians what has become of “your blessedness?”

The Question: HAVE I BECOME YOUR ENEMY BECAUSE I TELL YOU THE TRUTH?

Gal. 4:16-20

- What was Paul telling the Galatians about “false teaching” in **verse 17**?
- How is what Paul was saying different from the “law-teachers?”
- Paul was discipling the Galatians. This discipleship is also seen in ***Phil. 2:1-11***. What can we learn from this text?
- What is the right motive Paul is sharing in **verse 18**?
- In these verses, why would Paul feel like he is their enemy?

Application

- If you were a Galatian, what, as a practical matter, would you do to become “like” Paul?
- What can we learn from Paul about the work it takes to disciple others?
- How do we act as an enemy when we teach people the truth of God’s word?
- Paul is “appealing” to the Galatians. What is the “appeal” you hear from God in this message from Paul?
- As we move forward on this Journey to Greatness, what must each one of us let go of?
